Please stand only for The Royal Procession at 11.20 a.m. and The Queen's Procession.

ORDER OF SERVICE

At 10.25 a.m. the Dean and Chapter, the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury leave the Dean's Aisle and proceed down the South Aisle to the Great West Door of the Cathedral.

At 10.30 a.m. Visiting Representatives of World Faiths leave the Minor Canons' Aisle and move to their places under the Dome.

At 10.30 a.m. the Choir of Her Majesty's Chapels Royal, the Choir of St Paul's Cathedral, the College of Minor Canons, Visiting Ecumenical Dignitaries, the Company of Honorary Canons, the College of Canons, Visiting Anglican Dignitaries, the Primus of the Episcopal Church of Scotland, the Archbishops of Wales and Armagh leave the Dean's Aisle and move to their places in Quire.

At 10.35 a.m. the Speaker, having been received by the Dean and Chapter, the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury, leaves the West end of the Cathedral and moves in procession to his place under the Dome.

At 10.35 a.m. the Lord Chancellor, having been received by the Dean and Chapter, the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury, leaves the West end of the Cathedral and moves in procession to his place under the Dome.

At 10.35 a.m. the Procession of the Orders of Chivalry leaves the Minor Canons' Aisle and proceeds down the North Aisle to the West end and the Centre Aisle to seats at the East end of the Nave.

From 10.35 a.m. Members of the Royal Family arrive by car and move in procession to their places under the Dome.

At 10.55 a.m. the Kings of Arms, Heralds and Pursuivants leave the Minor Canons' Aisle and proceed to the West end of the Cathedral.

From 11.10 a.m. Members of the Royal Family arrive by carriage at the foot of the steps and are conducted to the Great West Door.

At 11.20 a.m. the Lord Mayor arrives at the foot of the steps to await The Queen's arrival.

At 11.20 a.m. Members of the Royal Family move in procession through the Nave to their places under the Dome.

At 11.28 a.m. Her Majesty The Queen, His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, The Prince of Wales and The Princess Royal arrive at the foot of the steps and are conducted to the Great West Door. Her Majesty is preceded by the Lord Mayor bearing the Pearl Sword.

Her Majesty The Queen, His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh, The Prince of Wales and The Princess Royal are received by the Dean and Chapter, the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury and a procession is formed.

A fanfare is sounded and all stand.

Members of the Royal Family move in procession from their places under the Dome to the Great West Door of the Cathedral where the Dean and Chapter, the Bishop of London and the Archbishop of Canterbury take their leave.

Her Majesty's Body Guard of the Honourable Corps of Gentlemen-at-Arms leave their positions under the Dome and move by way of the Centre Aisle, the West end of the Cathedral and the North Aisle to the North Steps leading to the Crypt.

The Queen's Body Guard of the Yeomen of the Guard leave their positions at the East end of the Nave and follow the Gentlemen-at-Arms.

The Choir of Her Majesty's Chapels Royal, the Choir of St Paul's Cathedral, the College of Minor Canons, Visiting Ecumenical Dignitaries, the Company of Honorary Canons, the College of Canons, Visiting Anglican Dignitaries, the Primus of the Episcopal Church of Scotland, the Archbishops of Wales and Armagh move from their places in Quire and return to the Dean's Aisle.

The Lord Chancellor's Procession moves from under the Dome to the Great West Door of the Cathedral.

The Speaker's Procession follows to the Great West Door of the Cathedral.

The Procession of the Orders of Chivalry moves from seats in the Nave by the Centre Aisle, the West end of the Cathedral and the North Aisle to the Minor Canons' Aisle.

The Visiting Representatives of World Faiths move from their places under the Dome to the Minor Canons' Aisle.
